

Use Adaptive Tools:

Provide access to tools like flexible seating, noise-canceling headphones, and fidget devices to accommodate different sensory needs.



Flexible Learning Environments

Arrange the Classroom for Accessibility:

Organize furniture and resources to allow easy movement and access for all students.

Create Quiet Areas:

Designate spaces for students who need a quieter environment to focus or reduce sensory overload.

Continuous Feedback and Assessment

Formative Assessments:

Use frequent, low-stakes assessments to gauge understanding and provide timely feedback.

Diverse Assessment Methods:

Access and use various assessment techniques, including quizzes, peer reviews, portfolios, and presentations, to capture a fuller picture of student learning.

Self-Assessment and Reflection:

Self-reflection is essential in learning. For example, give students time and space to reflect on the process and assess their work.
